In Biomedical Physics few topics were removed as it was not important to understand as a Physiotherapist e.g, determination of velocity of sound in air, the vibration of the string, enthalpy, entropy etc.

• In Second Year B. Physiotherapy Syllabus few changes were done:

In Microbiology subject, in Bacteriology, Syphilis and in Mycology, Scabies were removed, but as per the current demand in Virology component Corona included as Physiotherapy perspective it is important and the role of Physiotherapy in COVID-19 is also there.

Few reference books were added in Microbiology: Essential of Medical Microbiology by Rajesh Bhatia and Essential of Medical Microbiology by Apurba Sankar as suggestions were from respective microbiology Faculty.

Dr. Pratapsinh Chauhan was granted leave of absence.

Dr. Suneet Saxena, Dean, Faculty of Business Management chaired the meeting and welcomed the members. He introduced the members on the Board of Studies for FoBM and expressed his special thanks to Dr. Sanjay Bhayani, Dr. Hanuman Prasad and Dr. Hitesh Shukla for their valuable presence.

He informed the Board that the Programme Assessment Committee (PAC) has submitted the Program Structure for MBA and its curriculum.

After that, the agenda items listed were taken up for discussion and the following resolutions were passed.

Item No. 1: Program Structure of MBA for the Batch 2016-2018

The Proposed Program Structure for MBA was presented to the Board. The Board was informed that feedback from industry and academic experts were taken before finalizing the proposed program structure for MBA.

The Board reviewed the proposed program structure and noted that courses like Entrepreneurship and Managing Start-ups, Export Import Policy Procedure & Documentation, E-commerce have been introduced which are the need of the hour.

The Board also noted with satisfaction that a proper blend of core, specialization, projects and elective subjects has been maintained in the proposed program structure.

The Board after due deliberations approved the Program Structure and Teaching Evaluation scheme of MBA Program for the Batch 2016-2018. (Annexure 1)

Resolved to approve item no 1 and recommend the same to the Academic Council.

Item No. 2: Non-credit courses in addition to the courses included in the program structure. (Add On Certification Courses)

The Board was informed that based on the feedback received from industry experts, the PAC has proposed a number of add on certification courses to be offered to students in addition to the courses under the formal credit system. The following courses were proposed:

- Advanced Corporate Communication of 16 hours duration
- Advanced Excel Certification of 32 hours duration
- Six Sigma of 30 hours duration
- Digital Marketing of 20 hours

Following modifications were suggested:

- Dr Hanuman Prasad suggested that the duration of Advanced Corporate Communication may be increased to around 30 hours to provide students a platform to practice corporate communication ultimately making them employment ready. He also suggested to increase the duration of Digital Marketing to approximately 35 hours to give maximum benefits to students.
- Dr. Sanjay Bhayani suggested that these add on certification courses should be made available to students across the two years duration of program in such a form that one such course is offered in each semester.

The Board reviewed the proposed add-on certification courses and after due deliberations approved the following:

- Advanced Corporate Communication of 30 hours duration in semester 1
- Advanced Excel Certification of 32 hours duration in semester 2
- Six Sigma of 30 hours duration in semester 3
- Digital Marketing of 36 hours in semester 4

Resolved to approve item no 2 and recommend the same to the Academic Council.

Item No. 3: Syllabus of MBA Courses and Add on Certification Courses

The detailed syllabi of courses approved for the Program Structure of MBA and the Add on Certification Courses were presented.

Following modifications were suggested:

- Dr. Hitesh Shukla suggested that for the course titled "Accounting for Managers", books authored by S. N. Maheshwari & S. K. Maheshwari and P. Tulsian may be shifted to reference books and those by R. Narayan Swami and Ambrish Gupta may be taken as Textbooks.
- Dr. Sanjay Bhayani suggested that for course "Managerial Communication", language lab should be included and the books authored by Asha Kaul and Crafting of Letters by Monipally may be included in the list of books.
- Dr. Sanjay Bhayani suggested that for Course "Research Methodology, the topic IT in Research, should be included in unit V.



- Dr. Hitesh Shukla suggested that Economic Value Added (EVA) and Market Value Added (MVA) methods of valuation of Business should be included for "Financial Management"
- Dr. Hanuman Prasad suggested that the content for Advanced Corporate Communication and Digital Marketing should be expanded to meet the requirement of 30 hours and 36 hours respectively as approved in item 2.

The Board reviewed the proposed syllabus of MBA and Add on Certificate courses and approved it after incorporating the modifications suggested. (Annexure 2)

He expressed special thanks to Prof. (Dr) Karunesh Saxena, Prof. (Dr) Rajasekharan Pillai, and Mr. Chetan Bhojani for sparing their valuable time out of their busy schedule to attend the meeting and providing suggestions. He discussed the need for the

development of a new curriculum and programme structure to include the recommendations of New Education Policy, 2020. As per the recommendations of the New Education Policy given by the Union Cabinet of India on 29th July 2020, and with the vision of an India-centric education system that contributes directly to transforming our nation sustainably into an equitable and vibrant knowledge society by providing high-quality education to all, he highlighted the key changes which have been done to align the recommendation in MBA (Regular and Business Analytics) programme structure and as well as syllabi. He also appreciated that in the present times the meeting has been organized online.

After that, the agenda items listed were taken up for discussion and the following resolutions were passed.

Item No. 1: To confirm the minutes of the 5th BOS meeting held on 4th September 2020

The minutes of the 5th BOS meeting held on 4th September 2020 were circulated among the members of BOS. Since no comments were received, this BOS approved the minutes of the 5th BOS meeting.

Item No. 2: To report the action taken, where necessary, on the various decisions taken by the BOS in its 5th meeting held on 04-09-2020

As a part of the action taken on the suggestions received and resolutions of the 5th BOS meeting, the members were informed that the actions have been taken on all the specific suggestions provided. The Board was informed that w.r.t. the suggestion provided by Dr. Karunesh Saxena to include SIG training on Entrepreneurship, the university has dedicated Centers - MUIIR for Entrepreneurship and CFB for Family Business which provide mentoring and coaching to students interested in entrepreneurship and/or upscaling their family business. With reference to the suggestion received on using MOOC platforms for certificate programs, the Board was informed that the University is considering signing a MOU with Coursera to provide such solutions. The Board was further informed that since the NEP implementation process is still in evolution stage it is desirable to provide more time to come up with proposals in this direction.

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The Board was further informed that faculty members have been advised to use group projects as a part of continuous evaluation component.

The Board noted the actions taken, where necessary, on the various decisions taken in its 5th meeting held on 4th September 2020 and expressed its satisfaction.

Item No.: 3 Revision of Program Structure of MBA

The Board was informed that since the current MBA program was last revised in 2017, it was felt that the program should be revised to keep it abreast with the changes in the industry requirements. The Program Assessment Committee sought feedback from various stakeholders and the suggestions so received have been incorporated in the proposed program structure of MBA. (Annexure 1)

The proposed program structure was presented and the following points were discussed and decisions were taken:

3.1 Addition of new Specializations.

The Board was informed that based on the feedback received from industry, the PAC recommended addition of five more specializations in the MBA Program Structure. The specializations proposed to be added have been decided keeping in view the industry demand for specific skills in these areas.

The Board noted with appreciation the addition of the new specializations under the MBA program and after due deliberations approved them. The additional specializations will be offered w.e.f. AY 2021-22. (Annexure 2)

Resolved to approve item 3.1 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

3.2 Addition of courses within existing Specializations.

The feedback from students suggested that they would appreciate more choices being offered to them within the specializations. Based on this, the PAC recommended offering a choice of 10 specialization electives in each specialization against the 8 choices of specialization electives available in the current program structure.

The Board noted with satisfaction, the addition of courses within existing specializations. The Board deliberated on course titles, teaching - evaluation scheme for the courses under the

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existing specializations and new specializations in the MBA program structure and after due deliberations approved the same. (Annexure 3)

Resolved to approve Item 3.2 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

3.3 Addition of General Electives.

The Board was informed that PAC received feedback from faculties to include some courses of general nature in the program structure which do not fall under any specialization but are needed for a management graduate. Taking that feedback forward, the PAC has recommended introduction of general electives during semester 3 and 4 of MBA program. The list of proposed General electives was presented. The Board deliberated on course titles, teaching - evaluation scheme for the proposed general elective courses to be offered in semester III and IV of MBA. After due deliberations, approval for the same has been given by all the members of BOS. These changes will be applicable w.e.f. AY 2021-22. (Annexure 4)

Resolved to approve Item 3.3 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

3.4 Addition of Skill Enhancement Courses

The PAC based on its internal deliberations as well as deliberations within the faculty group felt that since the students were putting in a lot of efforts and investing a lot of time in their academic schedule for the Add-on Certification courses, it is advisable to bring the add-on courses under the formal credit system of the MBA program. Furthermore, feedback received from faculty suggested that students should be given more options within the Add-on courses. Keeping the above suggestions in mind, the PAC recommended converting the Add on Certificate Courses to Skill Enhancement Courses with credits and to offer a choice of three such Skill Enhancement Courses out of which the student may choose any two in each semester. The Board noted with appreciation and approved course titles under Skill Enhancement Courses for MBA Program along with the suggested teaching - evaluation scheme.

After due deliberations, the Board approved the addition of Skill Enhancement Courses. These changes will be applicable w.e.f. AY 2021-22. (Annexure 5)

Resolved to approve Item 3.4 and recommend the same to the Academic Council. The Board also communicated its satisfaction with the presence of all categories of courses

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namely, core management courses, specialization electives, general electives, skill enhancement courses and projects.

Item No. 4: Syllabus of MBA Courses

The Board was informed that the proposed program structure as approved in item no 3 included some existing courses and many new courses have been added.

The details were taken up for discussion and approval as follows:

4.1 Revision of Existing Courses

The Board was informed that the PAC reviewed each existing course and recommended revisions in those courses keeping in view the recent developments in their respective fields. The revised syllabi of existing courses were presented and the Board noted with satisfaction that the courses have been updated to incorporate the latest developments in their respective areas.

Following suggestions were received:

- Dr. Pillai suggested to include "Communication Prior-During-Post any emergency" and "How to convey an unpleasant message" topics in the course Business Communication.
- For the course Business Research Methods, Dr. Pillai suggested to include few topics like Identification of research topics and its refinements, Review of Literature, Research Gap, Statement of Problem, Research Objectives, Research Questions, Hypotheses, Components of Research Design/Methodology, Various Data Collection methods. He also suggested to add the following books as reference books in the syllabus for Business Research Methods:

Item No. 5: Revision of Program Structure of MBA (Business Analytics)

The Board was informed that feedback from faculty members suggested that the two programs MBA Regular and MBA Business Analytics being post graduate programs in management should have some common courses of management domain. This will also help in having a common framework for introduction of domain-based post graduate management programs in future. Based on the suggestions received, the PAC has recommended a revised program structure for MBA (Business Analytics). (Annexure 8)

The proposed program structure was presented and the following points were taken up for discussion and approval:

5.1 Addition of new domain courses

The Board was informed that in order to keep the program updated with the latest developments in the field of analytics new domain courses were introduced while removing the courses which were outdated.

The Board reviewed the list of new courses introduced and communicated its satisfaction with the same. After due deliberations the Board approved the same.

Resolved to approve Item 5.1 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

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5.2 Addition of General Electives.

The Board was informed that PAC has recommended to include all the general electives approved for MBA program in item 3.3 to be introduced for the MBA (Business Analytics) as well citing the same reasons.

The Board noted with satisfaction and approved the addition of General Electives in MBA (Business Analytics) Program Structure.

Resolved to approve Item 5.2 and recommend the same to the Academic Council. The Board also communicated its satisfaction with the presence of all categories of courses namely, core management courses, domain specific courses, general electives and projects based courses needed for a domain specific post graduate management program.

Item No. 6: Syllabus of MBA (Business Analytics) Courses

6.1 Syllabi of courses aligned with MBA Program

It was recommended that syllabi of all the courses approved in item 4 for core courses and general electives should be extended for MBA (Business Analytics) for alignment of two programs.

The Board reviewed the proposal and after due deliberations approved the same.

Resolved to approve Item 6.1 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

6.2 Revision of Existing Courses

The Board was informed that the PAC reviewed each existing courses and recommended revisions in those courses keeping in view the recent developments in their respective fields. The revised syllabi of existing courses were presented and the Board reviewed them.

Following suggestions were received:

For the course Economics for Decision Making, Dr. Pillai suggested:

- To modify the course outcomes in line with the standard practice of mapping it with Bloom's Taxonomy.
- Removing some pure economics topics from the syllabus.
- To remove the overlapping in Module IV and V by removing Limit Pricing
- To include a topic on Decision Making under Risk and Uncertainty.

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- To include behavioural bias on investment like Dispositional Effect, Herding Behaviour, Hone Bias, Availability Bias and Overconfidence bias.
- To include trade cycle, exchange rate and macroeconomics in the syllabus.
- To remove the Modern Microeconomics by Koutsoyiannis from the list of textbooks and instead include the following textbooks:
 - Thomas, C. R & Maurice, S. C. (2016). Managerial Economics: Foundations of Business Analysis and Strategy. Mc Graw Hill
 - Samuelson & Nordhaus (1998) Economics. Mc Graw Hill

After due deliberations the Board, for the course Economics for Decision Making, approved the syllabus after incorporating all the suggestions provide by Dr. Pillai except for the inclusion of trade cycle, exchange rate and macroeconomics topics. It was resolved that the topics related to macroeconomics including investors' behavioral bias on investment will be taken up for consideration in the next cycle of syllabus update process. It was also resolved that instead of removing the pure economics topics, these topics will be taught to the students from the perspective of decision-making targeting utility analysis.

The Board approved all the other syllabi in their presented form. (Annexure 9)

Resolved to approve Item 6.2 and recommend the same to the Academic Council

6.3 Syllabi of New Courses

The syllabi of new courses introduced were presented. The Board reviewed the same.

The following suggestions were received:

The Board reviewed the suggestions provided by Dr. Pillai and it was decided that the topics suggested by Dr. Pillai will be taught to the students in the form of a Workshop in their semester 3 of MBA (BA) Program. - Introducing 1 year and 2 years of Master's degree courses.

Mr. Chetan Bhojani suggested introducing Self-Paced Online courses for the skill enhancement of students in future. He further suggested enhancing Emotional Intelligence skills of students through seminar and simulation exercises in addition to the general elective course on Emotional Intelligence.

Dr. Sunil Kumar Jakhoria suggested future recommendations for the Program Assessment Committee to work upon following:

- Introduction of 5 years of Integrated programme in Faculty of Management Studies,
 Marwadi University where multiple entry and exist options may be provided. The students may be awarded with Certification at every level.
- Alignment of Recommendations of the New Education Policy, 2020 with 4 years of graduate programme, with reference to last year which is devoted to Research.
- Including new components in teaching and evaluation scheme like open book examinations and take-home examinations.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to the Chairperson and all the members present.

- 7. The Final Report of the Internship shall be submitted in hard copy to the Faculty coordinator, while submitting the Final report in hard copy the Student shall sign the sheet of final report submission available with Faculty coordinator.
- 8. The student must make sure that the weekly and final report submitted by him/her shall not be a plagiarised, copied or similar to the work submitted by any other student of Faculty of Law, Marwadi







University, Rajkot.

9. In case weekly or final report have been found to be plagiarised, copied or similar to the work submitted by any other student of Faculty of Law, Marwadi University, Rajkot then such case shall be





considered to be a case of use of unfair means in examination. A committee shall be constituted by the Dean, Faculty of Law to inquire into the cases of use of unfair means. The decision shall be taken by Dean, Faculty of Law, Marwadi University based on the recommendations made by the inquiry committee.

- 10. The student shall submit a copy of the Internship Certificate counter signed by the her/him to the Faculty Coordinator allocated by the Internship Committee.
- 11. Non-submission of the certificate shall lead to cancellation the Internship and the student shall be repeating the same internship again in future.
- 12. A student shall make sure the internship office is submits the Confidential Internship Certificate to the Faculty Coordinator via mail or post in a sealed envelope.
- 13. Internship Confidential Certificate must be signed and seal of the Internship office/Advocate must be there on it, without signature and seal Internship Confidential Certificate shall not be considered for any purpose.
- 14. After the submission of final internship report, a viva-voce examination shall be conducted in which the student shall be examined by external/internal examiner. Students shall be evaluated based on the work they have done during the internship, presentation and practical knowledge gained.
- 15. If a student fails to complete internship, such student shall be declared fail. He/she shall have to complete the same internship in future in order to become eligible for the award of Degree of B.A.LL.B./B.Com.LL.B.
- 16. In case any misconduct or unprofessional behaviour of a student during internship is being reported by the internship office to the Internship Committee, Faculty of Law, Marwadi University, Rajkot, the same shall be inquired by a committee constituted by the Dean, Faculty of Law, Marwadi University, Rajkot and the decision shall be taken by the Dean, Faculty of Law, Mawardi University, Rajkot based on the recommendations made by the inquiry committee.





Item No.BOS/06/04(i):

To consider and approve revised Curriculum for B. Com Three Years program to be implemented from academic year 2021-22.

Mr. Jitendra Patoliya, Programme coordinator B. Com briefed the members regarding the need for revising the curriculum/ programme structure of B.Com. and the changes made in comparison to the previous curriculum. He presented and explained the revised curriculum/ programme structure to the members. The members were informed that the new curriculum has following salient features:

- i) Elective courses to be offered from semester 1 to 4. The number of electives increase in comparison to the previous curriculum
- ii) Introduction of three specializations namely Accounting and Auditing, Finance and Taxation and Marketing. In the previous curriculum no specialization was offered.
- iii) Introduction of Courses on skill enhancement and certification courses.

- i) as in the earlier years the students will continue to take noncredit courses intended to enhance skills and abilities namely; Fundamental of Stock Market in semester 1, Entrepreneurship in semester 2, Personal Tax Planning in semester 3, Advanced Excel in semester 4, Tally in semester 5 and Export Documentation in semester 6 along with the credit courses.
- ii) from the academic year 2021 students will be offered a two-credit university open elective in semester 1,2,3 and 4.

The members made the following observations

Dr. Sanjaya Bhayani brought to the notice that course titled "Principles of Marketing" should be offered as a compulsory course instead as a elective as it will aid student learning of course titled Fundamentals of Digital marketing which is offered as compulsory course. Dr. Bhayani advised to refer the Model curriculum of UGC and make the changes wherever possible. Here too Dr. Bhayani retorted that if not all certain courses should be identified were in flexibility is given to the faculty to evaluate the student at the end of the course rather sticking to a fixed way of evaluation. Mr. Ketan Gandhi suggested that if possible now or later team work based evaluation should be implemented as it will assist students in their job because when student join industry most of the work is team work. The suggestions were well taken and it was decided that Mr. Patolia along with the team should deliberate and incorporate the changes suggested by Dr. Bhayani and wherever possible make the changes in evaluation scheme. It was resolved as under:





The same was reflected in the programme structure and the same was presented in 6 th BoS meeting. However, later at the university level it was decided that the Open Electives shall be of 3 credits and offered in 3 rd and 4 th semester. As a result, the subsequent changes in the Programme structure of B.Com and B.Com(H) are being informed to all the board members. Annexure-I

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To consider and approve syllabus and teaching scheme of University Open Elective to be offered by FMS.

Dr. Sunil Kumar Jakhoria informed and explained to the board members that university (keeping in line with one of the major proposals of NEP to offer greater flexibility in courses offered to the students) has decided to introduce University open electives, a concept approved by the Academic Council. A student has to choose 2 electives during the entire duration of their programme and those electives will be deemed as university wide open elective. To begin with, these electives will be offered in under graduate programmes and later extended to Post Graduate programmes. A pool of such university electives will be created where every department in the university will contribute. In addition, courses like music, NCC, sports, performing arts etc. are also to be included. These courses will be available to the students other that the department/ faculty offering it. As a common guideline these courses shall not be too technical in nature, there is no lab component and there is no pre- requisite to the course. The Faculty of Management Studies, to begin with will offer nine courses, four in management and five in commerce.
